Statement of Faith

We believe in one God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The Triune God has created man in His own image and has called him to manifest and reflect holiness through obedience to His commandments. Because man has woefully fallen in this responsibility and entered into a state of moral corruption, he has subsequently become estranged from his creator.

A This grade represents outstanding academic achievement on the part of the student. This grade indicates consistency of excellence for work in the given course. It reflects the student's ability for independent work, thoroughness, creative and effective use of knowledge, and the ability to view the subject matter with discernment.

B This grade represents academic achievement well above the accepted standard. Reception of this grade points to the ability to understand, evaluate, retain subject matter, and the ability to apply the knowledge gained with above average initiative.

C This grade represents a satisfactory degree of academic achievement. A "C" is the minimum standard for graduating with a degree from the Carey International University of Theology. It indicates that the student has fulfilled the basic requirements of the course including understanding of the material, and adequacy in assignments.

F This grade represents an unacceptable level of work. The student has not met the minimal requirements and standards of the course. A student receiving this grade may retake the course for the purpose of grade improvement up to a "C" only with administration approval.



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Progression

All students may repeat failed courses in their entirety. A student who fails two courses within the program will be placed on academic probation with further failures leading to a transfer to a non-degree certificate or diploma program.

Entrance Qualifications

All students must have a High School Diploma upon registration or qualify as a Mature Student.

Mature Students

Students who have not earned a High School Diploma or who do not meet the normal admission criteria can be considered for admission as a mature student provided the following conditions are met:

1. The applicant must be at least 21 years of age and have been away from formal education for at least two years.
2. The applicant may receive a conditional acceptance and be placed on probation for three courses.

Program Applications

One official academic transcript from each secondary and post-secondary institution that you have attended must be submitted with your application to any academic program. Transcripts should also be forwarded for students requesting transfer credits.

- a) Transcripts must show all courses, marks and the awarding of degrees.
- b) Transcripts should be forwarded directly from the institution in a sealed envelope. Faxed transcripts are not accepted.
- c) If the transcript is not in English, a certified translation (signed and stamped/sealed) must also be included.
- d) All documents and transcripts submitted to the Carey International University of Theology become the property of the university and will not be returned.

Supplementary Admission Requirements

Some programs may ask for supplementary information such as a student profile, resume, statement of interest, and references.



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English Competency

The following conditions must be met by students whose first language is not English for entrance to academic programs:

Unless a student has completed three or more years of post-secondary work at an institution in which English was the language of instruction, or has been employed for a similar period of time in a position in which English was the primary language of communication, the student is required to demonstrate competency in English.

The usual means of proving English competency are by taking one of the following examinations:

International English Language Testing System (IELTS)	7.0
Michigan English Language Assessment Battery (MELAB)	90
Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)	550
<i>AND</i> Test of Written English (TWE)	4.0

Test results should be sent directly to the Registrar's office from the original source. All students will be evaluated on an individual basis. The Registrar reserves the right to require any student whose first language is not English to take non-credit ESL courses, tutoring or training as part of graduation requirements.

Transferability of Credits

Credits from the Carey International University of Theology may be transferred to other colleges. However, every college retains its own sovereign right to determine what credits it will accept on a transfer basis. Therefore, credits earned at the CIUT and their transferability to another academic institution is at the sole discretion of the receiving institution.

Academic Dishonesty

Dishonesty consists of misrepresentation in an attempt to deceive. The Carey International University of Theology expects its students to manifest a commitment to Christian integrity and high academic standards. Plagiarism, representing another person's work, words, or ideas as one's own without the use of properly recognized academic stands (e.g. MLA format), is prohibited. Any violation of this standard may result in the suspension or expulsion of the student from the academic program in which he or she is participating.

The following procedures will be followed if academic dishonesty is suspected:

- a) If plagiarism is suspected, the tutor will contact the student to explain and verify any charge of plagiarism.
- b) First Offence—The student will be given an 'F' on the exam, course paper, or assignment. The tutor shall notify the Registrar and make a written record of the incident, which shall be placed in the student's academic file.
- c) Second Offence (in the same or another course)—The student will be given an 'F' in the course and, in addition to the steps outlined in a) and b) above, shall arrange a conference call meeting with the Registrar and member(s) of the faculty.
- d) Third Offence—The student shall be dismissed from the college as recommended by the Registrar and approved by the Academic Committee. The student shall be informed of all decisions taken and has the right to appeal these decisions.

Graduation Requirements

1. Satisfactory completion of all courses and assignments with a minimum grade of 60%.
2. Payment of all course fees.

Transcripts

Transcripts are produced for every student after the completion of each level and each program. Additional transcripts may be ordered from the Registrar for a fee of \$15.

Proctor

For successful completion of Carey International University of Theology courses, each student requires a proctor. A proctor may be a pastor, church leader, teacher, or other person unrelated to the student. The proctor supervises the examination, assures that the student completes the exam in the allotted time, assures that only a Bible (non-study) is used and that memory work is written without external aides, attests to its integrity by his/her signature, seals it in an official envelope, and mails it directly to the Registrar's office. The student should provide postage as a courtesy. The proctor receives all exams directly from the Registrar's office. All examinations are taken in the presence of the proctor.

Student Records

A student's record is considered confidential. *Only directory information may be released by the institution without the consent of the student.* Directory information includes the following: student's name, address, telephone number, birthplace and date, field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational institution attended. Portions of directory information may be withheld from a third party at the written request of the student. The administration maintains a permanent record on any student who has attended Carey International University of Theology. The student record currently includes the following: student's name, student number (if any), address, birthplace and date, sex, admission classification, credits transferred, all courses taken at Carey International University of Theology with credit hours, grades, and grade point averages, academic probation, academic suspension, academic dismissal, major field of study, degrees earned, and dates of graduation. Transcripts of student's record are released only on the student's written authorization.



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Program Information

Undergraduate

All undergraduate programs require that the student has a high school diploma or mature student status, and a completed application form including transcripts and references. An average grade of 60% is required for successful completion of each course.

Associate of Theological Studies (A.T.S.) – 60 Credits / 20 Courses

The Associate of Theological Studies has an emphasis on in-depth study, giving the student a good introduction to theology. This degree is designed to deepen the student's grasp of Scripture and the various disciplines of theology in order to be better prepared for service in the local church. Each course includes a final exam and a 12 page research paper. The degree is awarded upon successful completion of 20 Courses.

Bachelor of Theological Studies (B.T.S.) – 90 Credit Hours / 30 Courses

This advanced undergraduate degree is designed to prepare and equip Christians for leadership in a local church or parachurch organization. Each course includes an exam and a 12 page research paper. The degree is awarded upon successful completion of 30 Courses.

Graduate

Graduate programs require a recognized university degree, and a completed application form including transcripts and references. An average grade of 60% is required for successful completion of each course

Master of Theological Studies (M.T.S.) – 72 Credit Hours / 24 Courses

The M.T.S. is primarily oriented towards equipping individuals who wish to pursue a calling in the academic realm. It entails significant focus on Biblical studies and historical/systematic theology. Each course includes an exam and a 20 page research paper. The degree is awarded upon successful completion of 24 Courses.

Master of Theology (M.Th.) – 36 Credit Hours / 12 Courses Plus Thesis.

This research degree is ideal for those who have taken the Master of Theological Studies and who desire to pursue research. This degree can serve as a stepping-stone to a doctoral degree or be a terminal research degree. Entrance into the degree is dependent on an overall B+ average or higher in the preceding degree. Each course includes an exam and a 20 page research paper. The thesis is to be around 36,000 words with an oral defense. A minimum of four courses in either Greek or Hebrew is required, as preparation for the thesis. Students who have a M.Div degree can achieve the M.Th. upon completion of 4 courses plus a thesis.

Doctor of Theology (D.Th.)

The D.Th. degree is an advanced professional research degree. Applicants for this degree must have an M.Th. or D. Min degree, 3-years post ordination ministerial experience with academic and professional recommendations. This degree requires a published dissertation of around 80,000 words with an oral defense. Currently applications are only accepted in the area of New Testament, Church History and Pastoral Theology (4 courses in a Biblical language are required).

Biblical Studies – 24 Credit Hours

<p>Early Church/Creeds <i>This in-depth study of the theological and literary history of the Patristic and Early Mediaeval Church takes the student from the end of the Apostolic era, circa A.D. 100, up to the time of Anselm of Canterbury, c. 1033-1109. <p>Reformation Theology <i>This is a detailed study of the Magisterial Reformers, the English Puritans, and Western Evangelicals since the eighteenth century.
